President's Corner

Dear Superintendent Murray

Earlier this year (RE; Our letter of April 29, 2009 to North Carolina Department of Cultural Resources and copied to you) the Cape Hatteras Access Preservation Alliance formally identified four Spit and Inlet Area of the Cape Hatteras National Seashore Recreational Area (Seashore) as Traditional Cultural Properties potentially eli-gible to the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) under the Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as Amended. The four properties are

Bodie Island Spit and Adjoining Beaches:

Cape Point and Adjoining Beaches; Hatteras Inlet Spit and Adjoining 2) 3)

Beaches; and 4) South Point Ocracoke and Adjoining Beaches

The Cape Hatteras Access Preservation Alliance requests that the National Park Service advance the formal recognition of these areas as TCPs on behalf of Outer Banks village communities that hold the properties in value. These Outer Banks village communities maintain that the long standing access to, and the responsible use of the properties is critical to preserving their traditional culture and life ways. We have carefully reviewed the National Park

Service National Register Guidelines for Evalu-ating and Documenting Traditional Properties (Guidelines) and are confident the above properties: 1) constitute TCPs; and 2) are potentially eligible to the NRHP as such.

The Guidelines explicitly state that: "TCP designations are not to be limited to properties held in importance by Native Americans or other minority groups but that Americans of every ethnic origin have properties to which they as-cribe traditional cultural value. Further, if such properties meet the National Register criteria. they can and should be nominated for inclusion in the NRHP."

The properties in question clearly meet the Guidelines' verbatim criteria for a TCP in that they are: "1) components of a rural community whose organization patterns of land use reflect the cultural traditions valued by its long-term residents; and 2) a location where the communities have traditionally carried out economic and other cultural practices important in maintaining their historic identity."

As TCPs, the historic properties in question not only help maintain the traditional identity of Outer Banks communities, but these sa communities have historically been shaped by the long standing use of these beach landscapes. Historically, Outer Banks culture has been inextricably tied to the surf zone, and remains so today. The surf zone has traditionally sustained the island economy and culture through commercial fishing, and also by way of recreational fishing and tourism. These latter activities have been ongoing for more than 50 years and are therefore considered to be of historic age. More importantly, the landscapes in question are held in importance by Outer Banks communities in a way that transcends heritage and the traditional economy. The Cape Point stands as a defining physical feature of the Outer Banks, which consists of a narrow strip of land perched as much 30 miles out in the Atlantic Ocean. The other landscapes considered TCPs equally comprise the transitional realm between island home and the sea. As such, the historic properties continue to provide island folk with a profound sense of place and their use helps sustain the collective identity of their communities. In recent historic times, traditional com-

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mercial beach fishing has been eclipsed in im-portance by recreational surf fishing. Hook and line surf fishing itself, particularly for the iconic red drum has long held a defining place in Outer Banks culture. This sporting pursuit has histori-cally been undertaken by generations of Outer Bank residents and visitors alike, dating back to the turn of the 20th century, and continues to be of great economic and social importance today The very fact that non- residents and visitors participate in the traditional use of the historic properties in no way diminishes the cultural and historic value of those properties. The opposite is true. In many ways, Outer Banks culture is resilient, inclusive, and dynamic. Having nonresidents participate in aspects of traditional barrier island life is enriching to the public and makes protecting and preserving this cultural resource all the more important. In addition, the portions of the properties remain the focal point for the local surf dory seine net fishery. This economic activity represents a nearly extinct folkway as the Seashore beaches are one of the very last places in the country in which this traditional commercial fishery is practiced. The 1980 amendments to the NHPA specifically call for protecting and preserving these kinds of cultural activities.

It is important to emphasize that the activities that help define the historic properties in question (to include hook and line surf fishing) have not come about solely within the last 50 years, thus making them ineligible for consideration for protection under the Section 106 of the NHPA Rather, it is the cumulative sum of traditional

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social and economic surf zone cultural activities, both historical and contemporary, that have served to shape and helped preserve the identity of Outer Banks village communities over time It is precisely this unbroken pattern of cultural use, and the value attached to that use by the local village communities that qualifies the properties as TCPs. Much has changed on the Outer Banks since

the establishment of the Seashore. However, it is also remarkable how little has changed in terms of the local cultural landscape and its traditional use. This use is predicated on free and open access to surf zone, which supports the traditional local economy as well as being integral to social and cultural fabric of Outer Banks village communities. It should be noted that the maintenance of barrier island culture is largely unique to portions of the Outer Banks. Across much of the Eastern Seaboard, traditional barrier island settle ment, economic systems, and life ways have been obliterated by a transformation of coastal areas into nothing less than urbanized commercial districts. Other areas, most notably the Virginia Eastern Shore barrier islands have been abandoned to human settlement. This entire barrier island chain is in private conservation ownership as a coastal wilderness reserve. The widespread loss of traditional barrier island culture makes preserving the surviving elements of traditional Outer Banks life ways absolutely critical.

When the Seashore was being established, the director of the National Park Service promised in a published letter that Outer Banks communities will always have access to their traditional use areas. The communities have long viewed this

President Jim Keene called the meeting to order a 8:03AM. Board members not present were Dave Goodwin, Shelly Bembridge, Brenda Outlaw, Lew Spangler and Mike McNichol, Editor.

Director Laura Davis made the motion to accept the minutes from the June 13, 2009 BOD meeting. Director Mike Metzgar seconded. Motion passed

and the minutes were approved as written. President Jim Keene read the financial report submitted by Treasurer Brenda Outlaw. The cur-rent checking account balance is \$52,296.72. Some of which will be moved. Director Mike Metzgar made the motion to accept the Treasurer's report. Vice President Dave Joyner seconded. Motion passed. President Keene also reported the newly revised membership forms and the revised Constitution have been printed and are available. Direc-tor Burbic has received pricing on a new NCBBA fishing team flag. He will also follow up on the criteria for the Youth Award.

Membership Director Carol Mowers reported she will be attending the Greater Philadelphia Outdoor Sports show in Oaks, PA, February 24-28, 2010. This would be a great opportunity for members in that area to volunteer. She will also attend registration at the Nags Head Tournament, 4-Plus, NCBBA Red Drum, Hatteras Anglers Club and the Striper Tournaments. Table cloths

will need to be purchased for the NCBBA display She has received 2 entries so far for the annual photo contest

Director Mike Metzgar reported merchandise sales and membership sign-up have been doing very well on the website. The OBR, Citations and Contribution sites need some updating.

Past President John Newbold made a motion at the last BOD meeting in June to stop giving out NCBBA memberships to scholarship recipients. The motion was seconded by Brenda Outlaw. The vote was called and the motion passed. There were no NCBBA scholarship applicants this year. The requirements will change for next year with the addition of an essay.

Merchandise Director Laura Davis reported the internet ordering will have an impact on the tracking for merchandise ordering in 2010. The 2010 t-shirt design is currently in the works. Merchandise on consignment will be retrieved Director Davis is also considering a promotion

item for purchases over \$50. Under public relations and business practices there was nothing to report at this time

President Keene reported the NPS is on sched-ule with the ORV plan program.

Vice President Joyner reported he has the permit for the Red Drum Tournament; Director Mowers is on tract with putting the tournament book together, 250 participants have signed up and that he is still accepting door prize donations.

President Keene reported on the yearly charitable contributions that NCBBA makes to the Angel Tree, FOY, Fritz Boyden Youth Tournament, Fowler Tournament and the Ranger Program.

Vice President Joyner suggested adopting an Aviation unit of 44 not to exceed \$1,000. Director Metzgar made the motion. Director Davis seconded. Motion passed. The care package will be sent in February 2010.

The fall season finds Park staff experiencing a brief reprieve from the summer crowds and hectic summer operations related to the consent decree. The weather has cooled down nicely making outdoor activities pleasant once again Fishing is beginning to pick up just in time for the avid fall fishermen and miles of beach are open to welcome them back. On National Public Lands Day, September 26, numerous volunteers, including many representing NCBBA, conducted beach and road-side clean-up projects on the Seashore. In addition, a number of park staff volunteered their time to clean up wooden debris, sand fencing and other trash from the old Bodie Island Lifesaving Station site, as well as the shoulders of NC Highway 12 north of NCBBA's section. We greatly appreciate the ongoing ef-forts of NCBBA to keep park beaches and roads free of litter!

Though park operations are less intense now that the breeding season is over, NPS staff along with the environmental contractor that was hired by the NPS Environmental Quality Division (EQD) have been very busy working on the draft ORV management plan and EIS (DEIS). The DEIS will identify and evaluate the impacts of a number of different ORV management alternatives. Preparing a DEIS of this complexity is a time consuming process involving numerous NPS staff and subject matter specialists at the

Seashore, the Regional Office, and in Denver, as well as contractor employees. There are a number of discrete steps in the planning process, each with its own set of tasks and time frames. Since there are many "moving parts" in the process, it is difficult to precisely predict the exact completion date for each task; however, it is feasible to identify the "major milestones" or tasks with estimated time frames for completion. The ultimate deadline, which was established in the consent decree, is to issue the Record of Decision for the final plan/EIS by December 31, 2010, and the Final Rule (i.e., special regulation) by April 1, 2011. Currently, NPS is reviewing draft chapters of

the DEIS. Once the review and related editing is completed, the Seashore will submit the DEIS to the regional office (Atlanta) and Washington office for final internal review and approval to release the DEIS for public comment, which is estimated to occur late this fall. The DEIS release will be announced in a Federal Register Notice and local press release, followed by a 60-day public comment period that will include a series a public meetings. In addition, if you are on our emailing list, we will notify you directly by email when the DEIS is released for public comment. What We Believe - People & Nature in Harmony

At the core of the grassroots movement to Preserve Access to America's Beaches is the basic prin-ciple that people and nature can live together in harmony. This rational, common sense approach is

Supported by science and accepted by mainstream environmental conservationists. Long before Hatteras Island was ever designated by the Federal Government as a National Sease Approach is Recreational Area, the local residents were already proven leaders in protecting wildlife. Their love and respect for nature has always been heartfelt and genuine. For centuries they have worked devot-edly to preserve fish, turtles, birds, and other wildlife, following in the sacred tradition of the earliest area inhabitants, the Native Americans

Living in harmony with nature has been an established way of life for generations for the people of Cape Hatteras. They have faithfully "walked the walk" of true environmental protection and doing the right thing for wildlife.

Instead of living together in harmony with nature, misguided environmental groups are using disrup-tive lawsuits to limit access and force closure of America's beaches. These damaging lawsuits have hurt the local economy and the ability of families to earn a living as they have done for generations.

Some groups would have the general public incorrectly believe that people are inherently danger-ous to wildlife. In fact, the opposite is true. Conservationists, like the people of the Cape Hatteras National Seashore Recreational Area (CHNSRA), have been instrumental in helping many wildlife species flourish and thrive. In nature's circle of life, there are times when natural predators destroy bird nests or attack baby

turtles. It is always unfortunate and sad when predators, such as raccoons, sea gulls and other birds stalk and feed on natures most vulnerable. But, these attacks by natural predators have nothing to do

with people. Contrary to the claims of a few, people are not the natural enemy of wildlife. Some misguided environmental groups go so far as to advocate banning everyone from using the beach. They believe this draconian measure is necessary to eliminate even the possibility of someone ever committing a careless act on the beach. Reasonable people know however that outlawing beach access is not the solution. The truth is, most people are decent, law abiding citizens. But, in a free society we accept the risk that someone could deviate from the norm and commit a wrongful act. This is true everywhere; in neighborhood parks, nature walks, and on our beaches. The answer act. This is true everywhere; in neighborhood parks, nature walks, and on our beaches. The answer to preventing misdeeds is a combination of educational programs and strict enforcement of existing laws and regulations. Those who would deliberately break the law, on the beach or anywhere, should be severely punished. But, the extreme position of eliminating human access altogether, is irrational and excessive. It would be sad to ever think of our neighborhood parks, nature walks, and beaches without families enjoying them in a responsible and caring way.

The best long-term solution for beach access is encouraging a practical, common sense approach of people living together in harmony with nature. Sensible people, who truly love and respect nature, understand the soundness of this levelheaded and reasonable approach.

In the context of Section 106 of the NHRA, the letter clearly underscores that as early as 1952 the federal government recognized the importance of maintaining traditional Outer Banks culture as it relates to federal lands and undertakings. Some 50 years later, traditional elements of Outer Banks life ways are being severely and increas-ing threatened and thus need the protections that the NHPA of 1966, as Amended was specifically

Ethnographic Description of Eight Villages Adjoining Cape Hatteras National Seashore and Interpretive Themes of Heritage and History. According to the document's Executive Summary, the study "grew out of the National Park Service's recognition of the importance of understanding the social, cultural, and economic histories of communities affected by its policies and actions

In keeping with the National Park Service's legal obligation not just to understand and analyze the cultural resources under its domain but also to actively protect and manage all historic properties for this which it has responsibility, the Cape Hatteras Access Preservation Alliance requests that the areas in question be formally addressed as TCPs through the Section 106 Consultation proces

The Cape Hatteras Access Preservation Alliance requests to participate as a full consulting party in this Section 106 process. Further, given the recognized controversial circumstances surrounding this issue, and the inherent complexi-ties in listing to NRHP National Park Service properties, the Cape Hatteras Access Preservation Alliance would like to formally request that the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation be

invited to participate. We very much look forward to moving for-ward and working constructively with all parties through the Section 106 consultation process

Recently, the National Park Service published the results of a three-year research project entitled

Fishing Report

After a super sea mullet season, with several members earning more than ten citations, we are blessed with one of the earliest puppy drum seasons I can remember! Most fish have been caught in sloughs in the area between Coquina Beach and Oregon Inlet, and the bait of choice is fresh finger mullet which are plentiful now. Remember that the personal limit of mullet is two-hundred fish per day. Catch what you need, but no more.

On the subject of NCBBA citations: the Angler of the year program is based on the total of different species caught, and not on the total number of citations of only one or more species. To win, you must earn a citation for as many different species that we list on the citation form

Puppy drum are easy to catch and you do not have to cast a great distance to catch them. Proof here is the fact that more women fishing in tournaments catch puppy drum than men. Why... because they don't cast out as far!

Using a single hook on a fish-finder rig or the same double bottom rig I wrote about in the last issue will work, and I have come to believe have made, fluoro-carbon rigs and leaders catch more fish! fluoro-carbon line does a better job. In tests I

My personal best luck has come from using a double dropper loop rig made of 40 pound fluoro-carbon line and finished with 5/0 circle hooks. Many would argue that a larger hook should be used, and I would not disagree. Drum have large mouths and they open wide when taking a bait. That being said, I still recommend the 5/0 hook.

Next choice is to chunk or fillet the finger mullet. On my best recent day, two anglers caught nineteen drum, and I used fillets. Chunks tend to eliminate blues and other trash fish from biting but the fillet pieces seem to give off more aroma for the drum to pick up on. Remember, this fish hunts by smell and is a bottom feeder rather than

a sight feeder like a blue or spanish.

With circle hooks, do not set the hook on pick-up. Rather lift the rod up creating tension and begin cranking, remembering not to jerk back on the rod.

Fishing this way insures solid hook-ups with easy releases. Most all fish will be hooked in the corner of the mouth. Since the limit is one fish per day that must measure between 18 and 27 inches releasing out-of-slot or over-limit fish will be easy

with little or no damage to the fish.

Fish sloughs on both sides of breaks in the bar and fish short in the white water. Drum are lazy feeders and will let the surf and waves expose things for them to eat. Smart anglers put their baits in the feeding zone.

For me, there is no finer fish to catch than a puppy drum, with the exception of catching his mother or grandfather.

Editorial

In the past few months I have been pondering the ongoing battle initiated by various environ-mental advocates and a couple of things have become much clearer. It appears to me that the ultimate goal of the environmental groups is nothing less than a full closure of all Cape Hatteras beaches to ORV traffic. Many have reached this conclusion before me

and with good reason. There is an island many of you are familiar with called Cora June Island just off the ferry docks in Hatteras Village. This island has been documented as a large nesting area for many birds considered to be of special concern by the state of NC and Audubon Society in the consent decree. Unfortunately it is not part of Cape Hatteras National Seashore although it lies less than a mile away. This is one of a number of islands in the sounds where large numbers of birds nest.

It is not coincidence that these birds choose to nest on these islands. The birds choose these islands because there are no predators there. Most of these islands are too small and isolated to support a predator population and birds being relatively smart creatures instinctively know this In the meantime the NPS traps and disposes of large numbers of predators within the Seashore to protect a small number of birds that choose to nest in unsafe areas of open beach. A total of 6 Piping Plover chicks fledged this year on Hatteras Island, 1 fewer than last year in spite of the consent decree and the predator control program.

It is important to note that Cora June Island is a manmade dredge spoil island, created from dredge operations to maintain the Ocracoke-Hatteras ferry channels. Let's suppose that the National Park Service, Audubon Society, Southern Environmental Law Center, et al. want to truly increase available breeding grounds for these nesting shorebirds. It would seem logical that instead of spending hundreds of thousands of dollars in lawsuits and lawyers that they would come together with local governments and user groups to find a solution. A logical solution might be to create more islands to provide what seems to be ideal habitat for these birds, while providing stable deep water channels for ferry operations and local marinas. With the money spent on lawsuits and lost by local businesses we could have created a better local economy and more prime breeding grounds. However, at this point we are left with what appears to be a long legal battle and a declin-ing local economy. The current course of action by the environmental groups is illogical ... unless their goal is total beach closures to ORV's. The NCBBA will continue to provide funding

and support to keep our beaches open and your help is critical. Please consider contributing to the NCBBA Legal Fund as there are many more legal challenges to come.
