Secretary's Report: Highlights of Board Meeting: March 26, 2011 by Dottie Broadbent, Secretary, #12666

President Dave Joyner called the meeting to order at 8:45AM. The President welcomed guest members Jim Wilson #10331 and Mike Hayes #13268 to the meeting. Treasurer Beverly Cox was not in attendance.

Secretary Dottie Broadbent requested that the minutes from the January meeting be accepted as written. The board accepted the minutes.

There was no Treasurer's report available due to Treasurer Cox's absence.

Director Mike Metzgar gave the report on the budget. After working with Treasurer Cox a few changes were made but only in the descriptions and not in numbers.

Vice President Tom Burke gave the report on fishing tournaments. The first tournament of the year is the Ocracoke Invitational Surf Fishing Tournament. Members to make op the team of 6 will be Harry Nash #6980 Team Captain, Dave Wigginton #335, Earl Ross #14163, Chris Davis #14081, Larry Harmon #9054, and Mitch Bademan #412.

The fishing tournament held during the Annual Meeting will have a few minor changes that will be in the newsletter. One was that there will be no minimum on the size limit. Another change was to add the Red Drum back to the list of species with the encouragement of catch and release.

Angler of the Year Award at this time is Sharon Newbold #4593 with fish in 3 different categories, Dennis Newton #11368 with fish in 3 different categories and Ernest Hughes Jr. #10422 with fish in 2 different categories. At this time Dennis Newton is in the lead with the most and largest fish.

On the Citation Program, 25 citations have been received at this time. 12 Sea Mullet, 1 Flounder, 7 Pompano, 3 Sheapshead, 1 Red Drum and 1 Cobia.

Director Rod Palmer had his report on the Operation Beach Respect and Adopt A Hwy program. At this time there are 35 members who have volunteered. The NPS still has not issued the permits but they have been approved.

Director Carol Mowers had the report on membership. Due to the cost NCBBA will not attend the Oaks Pennsylvania Outdoor Show. Instead a booth at the Raleigh, NC Saltwater Tackle Show will be looked into for 2012. Another event NCBBA will attend next year will be the Great Bridge Fishing Club Tackle Swap Meet.

Different avenues are being looked at to inform members that their dues are up for renewal.

For Achiever of the Year award Dave Gresens

is in the lead with signing up 13 new members. Director Metzgar had the report on the internet and website. E-mail addresses are needed from members to be used for Constant Contact. The new Election Ballot for voting is in place and is mistake proof. All ballots will be sent directly to Director Palmer the Election Chairperson.

The forums on the web site were removed due to slow activity, spam and rude remarks.

With Directors Rod Palmer and Dave Gresens volunteering to monitor the forums they will be put back up on the web site.

A separate program has been set in place for the RDT applications so they can either be filled out on-line and paid thru PayPal or can be printed out and sent in with a check. Annual Meeting tickets can also be purchased on-line using the new program.

Director Laura Davis had her report on merchandise. The web site has generated \$2,863.06 since January.

The BOD at this time agreed on a uniform to be worn at official functions.

Director Pete East had his report on public relations. Three newspapers were contacted about the upcoming OBR and AAH.

There was nothing to report on the Junior Membership Program at this time because of the inactivity of our Jr. Members.

Director Mike McNichol gave his report on the newsletter. A few articles still were not in but for the most part the paper is on schedule. Extra newsletters are needed for the OBR's to give out. Director Mowers wants to poll the members to see if more than one newsletter is needed to be sent to one household or if they would prefer to receive theirs via e-mail.

On fundraising Director McNichol reported that a four page insert can be added to the newsletter at a onetime cost of \$524. For 5,600 copies

that would have advertisements sold to help pay for the cost.

At this time Director Dave Gresens informed the board on how the organization could become a benefactor on the list of combined federal campaign where federal employees who donate a percentage of their income to a charitable organization that is part of the program along with the United Way.

The license plate donation program is in the design stage at this time.

President Joyner reported on the Red Drum Tournament. The plan of action was sent out to the board. Once the Annual Meeting is over then more time will be spent on the tournament. Permits have been applied for but not received yet.

The UMAP meeting will be attended by six delegates from the NCBBA.

Vice President Tom Burke made the motion that the board members not have to pay for a ticket to the Annual Meeting/ Pig Pick, was seconded by Director East and the motion was passed.

Director Davis at this time went over the list of duties for the Annual Meeting. All bases are covered and beer permits have been applied for. The Board was reminded to pick up the donations for door prizes from their assigned locations.

President Joyner made the motion to adjourn the meeting, was seconded by Director East and the meeting was adjourned at 12:58PM.



Now is the time for everyone to register for NCBBA's 3rd Annual Red Drum Tournament being held October 19th – 22nd, 2011. Fishing 01 A.M., October 20th until 4:00 P.M., October 22nd.

Previous Anglers & Judges of NCBBA's 2nd Annual Red Drum Tournament were given an application for this year's tournament in their 2010 Angler / Judge's packets and had until June 1, 2011 for us to receive your paid application / Judge request and have your T-Shirt size guaranteed. The tournament is now open to everyone, who will have until September 1st to register and have their T-Shirt size guaranteed. While desired, you do not have to be a NCBBA member to participate. If you have misplaced your application, contact me for a replacement. Don't be left out of this year's event as it could will the last one NCBBA is able to put on. If the Park Service pushes thru any of the alternatives proposed in the Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS) vehicular beach access to your favorite drum holes will be eliminated!

Judges are needed! Without them, we could not have a tournament of this type. If you are interested in being a judge you will be compensated for your time with a free entry into the tournament for

the times when you are not judging. Each judge works a 6 hour shift at least twice during the 3 day event. Each judge will be assigned a ramp to work 3 or 4 mile area between the ramps. Depending on the draw, some judges are scheduled to do an additional 4 hour shift Saturday afternoon. At least 30 people are needed for these positions.

Letter to NPS from Jeffrey Golding (aka "Wheat")

Dear Director Jarvis,

I am writing you in regard to the recent award presented by your office to Mike Murray, Superintendent of Cape Hatteras National Seashore Recreational Area. Mr. Murray recently received the Directors Award for Superintendent of the Year for Natural Resource Stewardship.

The National Park Service (NPS) stated in its press release that Mr. Murray "worked to build trust with local and regional stakeholders and guide his staff to produce a plan that relied on the best available science."

In fact, Director Jarvis, though this press release may read well and perhaps leaves NPS with a warm feeling of satisfaction, Mr. Murray has accomplished neither of the feats mentioned

When Mr. Murray arrived at Cape Hatteras National Seashore Recreational Area (CHN-SRA), He was greeted with open arms and hearts and minds full of hope. He was touted by some members of our community, including myself. as a "breath of fresh air" especially having come on the heels of the administration and actions of former CHNSRA Superintendent, Larry Belli; who had already done great damage to the level of trust between this community and NPS.

I will admit that Murray did settle things down somewhat and tempered the anger that was felt by those that visit or live here as I do. His stories of growing up visiting CHNSRA with his family and driving on our beaches relaxed many of us. I can recall during his "meet and greet" meeting at the Cape Hatteras Angler Club located in Buxton. the rousing cheer that arose as he openly told us that he considered ORV access to the Seashore a traditional and important form of access. He also seemed willing to follow the direction of the Congress as he developed per the enabling legislation, important points of egress allowing access to two extremely popular areas on Hatteras Island, Cape Point with the construction of a pass through at "the narrows" and the "spur road" Hatteras Island Spit, also known as "False Point".

Unfortunately, that's where the trust in Murray and the NPS ended for the majority of what your agency refers to as local and regional

Our community, which consists of residents of Hatteras and Ocracoke Islands as well as thousands of Americans from points all across this country, the owners of the Seashore, worked with the NPS to develop an "interim management strategy" (IMS) which was vetted and published in the summer of 2007. Although many of the provisions contained within that IMS were clear violations of the enabling legislation (16USC459 sec.4) our community was generally in support of the measures outlined therein.

The trust died for almost all of us as the negotiated rule-making process began in December of that year.

The members of that committee all agreed to refrain from any legal action during the year long process of developing rules for ORV access as required in President Nixon's 1972

Executive Order 11644, amended by Carter in E.O. 11989 (1977). However, in spite of their required agreement with the Secretary of the Interior, the Audubon Society and the Defenders of Wildlife (DOW), represented by the Southern Environmental Center (SELC), filed a lawsuit against the NPS in February of 2008 while the negotiated rule-making process was already underway. Of course the plaintiffs argue that they filed in October of 2007 which is in fact a lie. They did file intent to sue, but that; Mr. Jarvis

What was more alarming was that the public was inadvertently notified during the first scheduling conference in the courtroom of one Judge Terrance Boyle, Fourth Circuit, Eastern District of North Carolina, that your agency and the plaintiffs had already begun negotiations regarding the lawsuit which is a clear violation of the Federal Administrative Procedures Act (FAPA): as you are required to publish the fact that your agency intends to enter negotiations with a "Non Governmental Organization" (NGO).

Adding insult to injury Mr. Jarvis is the fact that the plaintiffs were allowed to remain on the negotiated rule-making committee in spite of their gross violation of the requirement set forth by the head of the Interior Department.

As Chief Federal Officer (CFO) during these negotiations, it was Mike Murray's job and legal obligation to enforce the rules established by Interior and this, he did not do. The result was the complete failure of the entire rule-making process at the expense, and loss, of the American taxpayer and my community.

Is this how the National Park Service defines "developing trust with local and regional stakeholders" Director Jarvis? How can that be stated when your agency could possibly, and probably will, be sued again by DOW, Audubon, and SELC when the "final rule" is published? In fact, that action could come from both sides of the issue...trust?

Mr. Murray has also tossed aside consideration of the Seashore as a Traditional Cultural Property (TCP) in spite of the fact that the Seashore, its traditional use patterns, traditional culture, and methods of egress to the beaches far exceed the requirements set forth in the National Environmental Policy Act.

Even your agency admits that our traditions began long before the Seashore was estab-

Mr. Murray's "plan", the NPS "Alternative F" found within the 2011 Final Environmental Impact Statement, will also require ORV users to purchase a permit (cost yet to be determined) to pay for the loss of access to miles of beach in support of a new set of "Vehicle Free Areas" which never existed except within some reasonable seasonal closures. The ORV driver will be forced to pay for the proposed parking and facilities needed to support pedestrian only access areas which will cause resentment and user conflict which your own regulations require you to avoid. This is both unfair and unreasonable.

able science" to format his preferred alternative is beyond ridiculous Mr. Jarvis.

The best available science, in fact your own records, show that access to this Seashore, be it by ORV's or pedestrians has had little or no effect on this resource throughout its history. Not a single study available to either you or me shows that at the Seashore, access, and particularly by ORV, has caused "considerable adverse effects' to the resource. Indeed, it is stipulated within E.O. 11989 that such must be shown before closing a portion of an area to ORV use and yet Murray seeks to close significant and some of the most popular areas of this Seashore to all access on a permanent basis.

The claim that Murray has used the "best avail-

Again, Jon Jarvis, I ask, is this how NPS defines trust and best available science?

The NPS continues to rely upon the Voglesong study to justify portions of its plan and yet the peer review of same deemed the study essentially worthless and not worthy of further review.

The NPS has warped the current, incomplete, economic impact study so that no comparison between pedestrian and ORV users can be made and in fact ignored ORV use almost entirely at one of the most heavily used points of beach access, Beach Access Ramp 44, preferring instead to focus on the nearby, albeit considerably less used, Ramp 43.

The NPS blames an ORV for the broken wing of an American Oystercatcher chick (Simon and Shulte) in an area of Hatteras Island where ORV use doesn't exist except by NPS vehicles.

NPS utilizes the United States Geological Survey, Pawtuxet Protocols to justify 1000 meter buffers around the Piping Plover chicks in spite of the fact that no scientific justification supports

NPS is providing endangered species level protections for an assortment of avian species listed by the State of North Carolina as "species of concern" in spite of the fact that Gordon Meyers, Chairman of the North Carolina Wildlife resource Commission informed your agency that these birds needed no such protection.

NPS lost almost half of the turtle nests laid in 2010 and almost 40% of the nests every year prior because of poor management practice. What started last year as a record year of nesting turned into a record demise. It's important to remember MR. Jarvis, it's not the number of nests that matter here, it's the number of fledged chicks that fly away to become adults and hatched turtles making their way to the sea that make the difference.

Perhaps, Director Jarvis, you should ask yourself why NPS employees are unwelcome in some shops on these Islands. Perhaps you should read the various fishing boards and Island free Press as well as my blog, www.wheatseyeonhatterasislandnc.blogspot.com http://www.wheatseyeon- hatterasislandnc.blogspot.com> to find out more about the effects of Mr. Murray's plan.

I'll give you fair warning, you won't find trust, but you certainly will find an evisceration of what your service claims as the" best available science" as well as its current proposals, hardly the sign of trust that Murray's assistant, Cyndy Holda claims in her press release.

I would also recommend that you read the enabling legislation of the Seashore, something I can quote verbatim without prompt. Contained within is a very clear directive from the Congress of the United States which requires the NPS to develop this area for recreational use when it is needed, adaptable, and specific to recreation. Furthermore, the Congress forbids NPS to conduct any activity which would derogate from the mission established for this area except and unless NPS has "direct and specific" authorization from congress to do so, to which I might add, you do not have. (16USC459 sec.1a.-1)

Instead of this crippling plan that is by far more detrimental to beach access of all sorts, as well as our local economy which was shaped by years of NPS management and promises (Conrad Wirth, NPS Director), Murray needs follow the law extant and perhaps take a page out of the book of Superintendent Pedro Ramos and NPS Southeast Regional Director David Vela at Big

Cyprus, and actually fulfill the mission lawfully established, enacted by congress, and signed into law by the President of this nation.

The unfortunate reality Director Jarvis is that the NPS actions, belated as they are, previous or intended, have taken the community that has enjoyed this resource for decades, in some cases for generations, and turned it upside down without justification and in violation of the very law you purport you are required to follow. All of which has been under Murray's Management.

The other unfortunate reality is that Murray's plan is incomplete, even to this day. Rife with flawed, non-peer reviewed studies, or like the USGS Pawtuxet Protocols which were in many cases, peer reviewed by its authors, (which incidentally violates USGS peer review protocols) we are faced with a "plan" that will severely impact the economy of these islands already reeling from the NPS negotiated "consent decree". (NEPA) And in the process, NPS will deny many thousands of visitors to these islands the ability to access our beaches further impacting visitation.

Again, adding insult to injury, and apparently furthering trust (by NPS standards) between the aforementioned local stakeholders, Murray declare that those of us who are completely surrounded by the boundaries of CHNSRA, the residents of the eight villages, are merely visitors

How can NPS refer to residents of these islands, especially those whose families have resided here since the 17th century, as visitors? These families not only pre-date the establishment of the Seashore, Mr. Jarvis, they pre-date the establishment of this nation.

While it may be true that Mike Murray has earned and garners some sort of recognition for his efforts past, in this instance, developing trust and using the best available science, as purported by your agency, racks up as one more false claim by the National Park Service and reeks of an award given by and driven by agenda rather than merit.

In the end Director Jarvis, Mike Murray seeks to change the mission of the Seashore without authorization from congress and will destroy an economy and way of life in the process. Perhaps instead of giving an award to someone who wantonly violates federal law, you should present an award to those of us that stand for the open access that your agency cannot prove causes harm to our resource.

You graduated from the same school that a cousin of mine attended. He studied under George Wythe. You might have heard of him. He had some issues with oppressive government, as do I. In fact he wrote a short essay, of sorts, about that same issue in 1776 and apparently some people liked it. You could take a page out of his book also and I hope you will.

Mr. Jarvis, I defended Mike Murray as long as I could, and I was assailed all over the Internet for doing so. I can do so no longer, nor have I been able to do this for quite some time.

This resource can be managed sensibly, with sound science, with respect for tradition, providing NPS follows the guidelines for management of this area as established by congress.

It has long been demonstrated that residents and visitors to our beaches care for this resource which explains why your agency still has no need for a line item in your budget to pay for persons to clean these beaches. And vet our beaches are consistently rated one of the top ten beaches in the country.

You see, Mr. Jarvis, we have been taking care of this remarkable place, our home, and have so for generations. And we've managed to do that with free and open access all that time until your agency began to break the law in order to satisfy

I hope you will step up and find the courage to defend the law that provides all Americans the ability to recreate on these beaches. After all, I believe it is your moral and legal obligation.

Dear Director Jarvis:

My name is John B. Couch and I am President of the Outer Banks Preservation Association (OBPA). write you today to voice my concerns on the recent National Park Service brochure entitled "Off-Road Driving." A copy of this brochure is provided with this letter.

This offensive brochure unfairly depicts off-road vehicle users as lawless thrill seekers that have contempt for the laws, rules and regulations that provide a framework for safe and responsible ORV

The back page of this brochure contains a photo of a female Loggerhead turtle that was crushed by a vehicle while it was attempting to nest. This unfortunate tragedy occurred on Ocracoke Island beach in the Cape Hatteras National Seashore Recreational Area in the early morning hours, during the summer of 2010.

The individual responsible for this crime was never apprehended, though the groups advocating responsible access, including OBPA, offered a substantial reward for the arrest and conviction of this individual. We will therefore never know the reasoning or affiliation of this individual, whether a visitor illegally driving on the Seashore during hours restricted by the court sanctioned Consent Decree or even a Park Service employee on a night drive.

This photo is disgusting, infuriating, and reflects a deliberate effort to provide extreme environmental groups the ability to further their agenda in banning motorized access to all National Parks.

When we received a copy of this brochure, we raised our concerns to the CHNSRA headquarters in Manteo, North Carolina. They reported that the staff of the NPS in Washington, D.C. developed the brochure as a result of a lawsuit settlement with an environmental group known as "Friends of the Earth." They advised that NPS Washington headquarters called to specifically request the photo of the turtle that was run over for this brochure.

OBPA, along with North Carolina Beach Buggy Association (NCBBA) and the Cape Hatteras Anglers Club (CHAC), are organizations that have always advocated safe and responsible access to the Cape Hatteras National Seashore Recreational Area for both pedestrians and off-road vehicles. Our motto that has stood for almost 40 years is Preserve, Protect, Not Prohibit regarding responsible access to the Cape Hatteras National Seashore Recreational Area for all.

As you are aware the Cape Hatteras National Seashore Recreational Area just went through a Negotiated Rulemaking Conflict Resolution Process. OBPA, NCBBA, CHAC and 26 other groups joined with a common purpose to write a reasonable and acceptable ORV Plan. To show commitment to responsible access, OBPA, NCBBA and CHAC developed and financed an ORV brochure under the direction and approval of local NPS staff, a copy of which is also provided with this letter.

A partnership approach by all affected organizations could have made for a more beneficial educational publication. I ask you today to immediately remove these offensive brochures from the Seashore as well as from other NPS locations across the country, and replace them with documents incorporating local knowledge and experience which will more effectively serve to inform the public and protect these valuable resources

To continue to distribute this deplorable and contemptible brochure serves no beneficial purpose except to unfairly condemn and incite the law abiding public who comprise, by far, the majority of visitors who choose to recreate at our Seashore. Both sides of the access issues currently extant at Cape Hatteras National Seashore Recreational Area should work diligently for responsible access for all!



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Fishing Report

Glad to be back again in this issue. Fishing in Mexico, Costa Rica and Florida, along with doctor's appointments in February and March kept me from getting my report to the editor on time to make the

last issue! We caught nice fish every place we went, and yes, I was outfished by my wife, as usual. Let me start by thanking the many members for responding to my request for donations to our legal fund. Just as enjoyable were the letters you sent with your donations. We still need the rest of the membership to join in if we are to prevail in our cause for beach access

We finally had a great striper season this year, but it took a boat to reach them. There were almost no reports at all of beach-caught fish. I am sure you have already read about the commercial netting that took place and because of DMF rules in place, thousands of fish were discarded dead. What a waste of resource! I did see many sport fishermen and women catch and release stripers for sport and then follow behind trawlers and free-gaff their limit from the dead fish released from nets. Thanks to all who did this. By changing the rules to tonnage rather than a head count of fish per day, culling will be eliminated and this should not happen again. Extreme cold weather pushed the bunker south and the stripers came with them. There were many large fish, and the North Carolina state record was broken twice in two days, now standing at sixty-five pounds (I think).

As spring settled in, the northern beaches to Buxton were chilled by southwest winds which have kept water temps in the sixties. Better fishing all spring has been from Cape Point to Hatteras Inlet. Nice catches of blow-toads and sea mullet have come from those beaches with a few nice pompano, with not-so-good results in other areas. Even I was fortunate enough to land a two pound sea mullet. In addition, we had a good showing of large spring blues, fish weighing eight to twelve pounds and measuring to thirty-seven inches in length. Sharon Newbold #4593 won the annual member-guest tourney with just such a fish, weighing thirteen pounds and measuring thirty-seven inches. Working at a tackle store, customer after customer would come in telling of huge pick-ups, strong runs

and break-offs. Over and over I would tell them to loosen the drag a bit, especially if you are fishing with braid. These fish are powerful and fast and will shake their heads and jump out of the water to rid the hook. These blues in the fall would weigh between sixteen and twenty pounds! Maybe they

Cobia also made a great run this year, but it's winding down as this goes to press. Many fish weighing between seventy and eighty pounds were caught. Again, nearly all were caught from boats. I managed to get out once and caught a forty-one pounder. Fun and good-eating!


I also got to go out earlier in the season on the last day of the bluefin tuna season. We were allowed to keep a 'giant' in addition to one other fish in slot. After fifty-seven minutes, we pulled off what had to have been a four-hundred pound plus fish. We did catch and land two nice fish that weighed about two-hundred pounds apiece and measured about six and a half feet in length.

With the many bird closures in place, fishing for big drum at Cape Point was extremely limited and difficult for the brave few who were forced to walk in the water nearly three-quarters of a mile each way to get to the fish. At no time were they allowed to stand on the beach, including any and all gear they took with them. Nice fish were caught, but at night it would truly been a rough trip. Rest assured, NPS rangers were out in their trucks insuring no one trespassed onto the beach.

Missing so far this season are puppy drum. There has been no reports of anyone anywhere catching them, not even in the 'pond' at Oregon Inlet. Access there is closed to all but boaters since bird closures south of ramp four preclude access to the bridge or the pond.

Lastly, speckled trout have now returned to the kill fishery. You are allowed six fish per day, fourteen inches in length, with no more than two fish twenty-four inches or more.


